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COHORT SCHEDULE OVERVIEW



All students have an option to participate in virtual learning however, virtual learning should resemble the classroom.

Students must wear uniform, they must have a quiet space to study and there should be no animal or adult interruption during class time. The student will eat lunch and breakfast along with the class. Parent will pick up lunch and breakfast for the week each Friday.

If the child does not have on uniform, he or she cannot attend class. Disruptions will not be tolerated.

Pre-K

Monday through Friday 6:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.: sanitizing and disinfecting classrooms. No exceptions with pick up. Keeping the place safe means keeping it clean.

KINDERGARTEN AND NINTH GRADE

These Cohorts K-9th will receive on-campus instruction five days per week: Monday through Friday. Each day will be broken into sessions of live instruction and virtual learning on campus. Virtual learning will be music, art, coding and Spanish. Class for this cohort ends at 2:00. Buses will leave at 2:15 and parent pick up will be at 2:15. After Care begins at 2:15 and ends at 4:30. Maintenance team must do deep cleaning of classrooms, bathrooms, hallways, and all common areas so pick-up should be on time.

Chapel or assembly will be virtual on Fridays. Bible and praise and worship is daily.

TENTH THRU 12TH GRADE

These Cohorts will receive on-campus instruction five days per week: M-F. Each day will be from 8-12:30. Lunch and Bible will be from 12:30-1:30. Dismissal 1:30

2021-22 SCHOOL HOURS

Student drop-off begins at 6:30 a.m. Greater Hope Christian Academy's classroom instruction begins at 7:55A.M. Dismissal will be staggered from 1:30 - 2:15 p.m.



Greater Hope PRACTICES, POLICIES, and PROCEDURES for CONSIDERATION:

Drop-off/Arrival Procedures; Safety is our Priority:

Time 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily until further notice

All Children should bring a clean pair of shoes to keep at the school for the inside, older children should wear plastic covers that will be at the door until shoes are changed.

Temperatures will be taken upon arrival and when leaving. The parent's signature both times. Anything above 100.4, the child cannot stay. Students in K-12th will sign their own names on said sheet and use sanitizer before pen usage and after.

Please adhere to signage in the drop-off arrival area: Six feet of distancing is required

Pick-up and Drop Off Policy

- a. Please try to make sure that the same parent or designated person should drop off and pick up the child every day. If possible, individuals with serious underlying medical conditions should not pick up children because they are more at risk.
- b. Hand hygiene stations at the entrance of the facility should be utilized so that children, staff, and parents can clean their hands before they enter. If a sink with soap and water is not available, provide hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol next to parent sign-in sheets.

(Hand sanitizer is kept out of children's reach with supervised use.) Sanitary wipes are at the table for use after utilizing pen.

Arrival and drop off times must be consistent so as to limit direct contact with parents

Consider greeting children outside as they arrive.

Designate a staff person to be the drop off/pick up volunteer to walk all children to their classroom

Screening Procedures:

The best way to prevent the spread of COVID-19 is to prevent it from getting inside the facility.



GREATER HOPE SHOULD:

- Conduct a daily health screening of any person entering the building, including children, staff, family members, and other visitors to identify symptoms, diagnosis, or exposure to COVID-19.
- Not allow staff and children to enter the child care facility if:

They have tested positive for or are showing Covid-19 symptom. They have recently had potential exposure with a person with COVID-19.

- A potential exposure means being in a household or having close contact within 6 feet of an individual with a confirmed or suspected COVID-19 case for at least 15 minutes during the case's infectious period.
- Persons with COVID-19 are considered infectious from 2 days before onset of symptom until the end of isolation (discussed below in "Discontinuing at home isolation").
- Continue to monitor staff and child health throughout the day.
- Immediately isolate a child or staff member that develops fever, chills, shortness of breath, new cough, or new loss of taste or smell and send them and any family members home as soon as possible.
- While waiting for a sick child to be picked up, have a caregiver stay with the child in a place isolated from others. If the child has symptoms of COVID-19, the caregiver should remain as far away as safely possible from the child (preferably 6 feet) while maintaining supervision. The caregiver should wear a cloth face covering. If the child is over the age of 2 and can tolerate a face covering, the child should also wear a cloth face covering.

Persons who have a fever of 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit or above, or other signs of illness should not be admitted to the facility. Encourage parents to be on the alert for signs of illness in their children and to keep them home when they are sick.

Routine disinfecting/sanitization procedures:

Child care facilities should post signs in highly visible locations (e.g., facility doors, lobby, restrooms) that promote everyday protective measures and describe how to stop the spread of COVID-19 such as by properly washing hands and properly wearing a cloth face covering.

Caring for Our Children (CFOC) provides national standards for cleaning, sanitizing and



disinfection of educational facilities for children. Toys that can be put in the mouth should be cleaned and sanitized (see below). Other hard surfaces, including diaper changing stations, doorknobs, and floors can be disinfected.

Greater Hope has Intensified cleaning and disinfection efforts:

- We have developed a schedule for cleaning and disinfecting. Steam machines have been purchased and 25% peroxide cleaner is being used to disinfect.
- Routine cleaning, sanitizing, and disinfecting surfaces and objects that are frequently touched, especially toys and games. This may also include cleaning objects/surfaces not ordinarily cleaned daily such as doorknobs, light switches, classroom sink handles, countertops, nap pads, toilet training potties, desks, chairs, cubbies, and playground structures. Use the cleaners typically used at your facility.
- All cleaning products are used according to the directions on the label. For disinfection, most common EPA-registered, fragrance-free household disinfectants should be effective.
- If surfaces are dirty, they should be cleaned using a detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
- All cleaning materials are kept secure and out of reach of children per regulations.
- Cleaning products are not be used near children, and staff ensures that there is adequate ventilation when using these products to prevent children from inhaling toxic fumes.

Clean and Sanitize Toys:

- Toys that cannot be cleaned and sanitized are not used.
- Toys that children have placed in their mouths or that are otherwise contaminated by body secretions or excretions should be set aside until they are cleaned by hand by a person wearing gloves. Clean with water and detergent, rinse thoroughly, sanitize with an EPA-registered disinfectant, rinse thoroughly again, and air-dry.
- Machine washable cloth toys should be used by one individual at a time or should not be used at all. These toys are laundered before being used by another child.
- All toys that need to be cleaned are set aside. We try to have enough toys so that the toys can be rotated through cleanings.

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Clean and Disinfect Bedding:

• Send bedding that can be washed. Each child's bedding is separate, and consider storing in individually labeled bins, cubbies, or bags. Cots and mats should be labeled for each child. Bedding that touches a child's skin should be cleaned weekly.

SOCIAL DISTANCING IN THE CHILD CARE SETTING:

If possible, Pre-K classes will include the same group each day, and the same child care providers will remain with the same group each day. Special events such as festivals, holiday events, and special performances are cancelled or postponed until further notice.

- Keep each group of children in a separate room.
- Limit the mixing of children, such as staggering playground times and keeping groups separate for special activities such as art, music, and exercising.
- At nap time, the children's naptime mats are spaced out as much as possible, ideally 6 feet apart. Children will be placed head to toe in order to further reduce the potential for viral spread.

FACE MASKS:

Childcare staff are required to wear cloth face coverings. Children 2 years old and older are required to wear a face covering as described in the Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health Order for Universal Face Coverings, unless you fit one of the exceptions included in Section 3 of the Order.

If a child is outdoors and able to consistently maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet from individuals who are not a part of their household, they do not need to wear a mask.

If a parent, guardian, or responsible person has been unable to place a face covering safely on the child's face, they should not do so.

If a child 2 years old or older is unable to remove a face covering without assistance, the child is not required to wear one.

The Department of Health recognizes that getting younger children to be comfortable wearing face coverings and to keep them on may create some difficulties. Under these circumstances, parents, guardians, licensed child care providers in community-based and school settings or



responsible persons may consider prioritizing the wearing of face coverings to times when it is difficult for the child to maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet from others who are not a part of their household (e.g., during carpool drop off or pick up, or when standing in line at school). Ensuring proper face covering size and fit and providing children with frequent reminders and education on the importance and proper wearing of cloth face coverings may help address these issues.

DEALING WITH CONFIRMED POSITIVE COVID-19 CASES AND EXPOSURE TO COVID-19:

FOR CONFIRMED POSITIVE COVID 19-CASES:

- If the child is in care when the test results are confirmed positive, the child should be isolated until the appropriate party arrives to pick them up.
- Follow the "Discontinuing at home isolation" guidance below for timelines on returning to the childcare setting.
- The facility should close for a period of 48 hours following the confirmed positive COVID-19 case of child or staff member in attendance so that the facility can be cleaned and disinfected properly.
- The operator shall inform parents of enrolled children when there is a suspected outbreak of a communicable disease or an outbreak of an unusual illness that represents a public health emergency in the opinion of the Department of Health as per 55 Pa. Code §3270.136(b), §3280.136(b), and §3290.136(b).

*An outbreak is defined as a single positive COVID-19 case.

- The facility must report positive COVID-19 cases to the Department of Health (DOH) as per 55 Pa. Code §3270.136(d), §3280.136(d), and §3290.136(d). The facility must also report positive COVID-19 cases to the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS).
- Greater Hope will inform childcare staff of positive COVID-19 cases. Exposure to a person who tests positive for COVID-19:

Exposure is defined as being within 6 feet of the individual who tests positive for COVID-19 for a period of 15 minutes or more. It also means coming into direct contact with droplets from a COVID-19 positive individual. Persons who test positive are considered infectious 48 hours before the onset of symptoms. Persons testing positive but do not have symptoms are



considered infectious 2 days after exposure (if known) or starting 2 days before test date (if exposure is unknown).

ENSURING STUDENT SAFETY

In order to provide a safe atmosphere for students and faculty while on campus, Greater Hope Christian Academy will implement the following safety protocols:
